



## ANALYSE THE POEM LINE BY LINE



## Step 1: Read

Read the poem at least twice to yourself. Step 2 : Title Provides context

- Sets the tone
- Suggests meaning
- Offers interpretive possibilities
- Provides a framework
- Clarifies imagery
- Amplifies emotional weight

## Step 3 : Speaker

#### • Who "tells" the poem?

 Does the poem give any clues about the speaker's personality, the point of view, age, or gender? o Who is the speaker addressing? Does the speaker seem attached or detached from what is said?

## Step 4 : Mood and Tone

Some can be brooding or grieving;
others may have a song-like
cadence and rhyme.

 Think about the attitude each speaker or characters give off.

 Find out if there places where the poem's tone may switch and why.

## Step 5 : Paraphrase

- Paraphrasing may seem pretty self-explanatory.
- This is not about skipping lines or condensing.
- Translate figurative language or unclear phrases into simpler terms.

## Step 6 : Theme

- o What is the subject?
- Who is the speaker?
- o What situation are they in?
- How do they feel about the subject?
- What is the mood?
