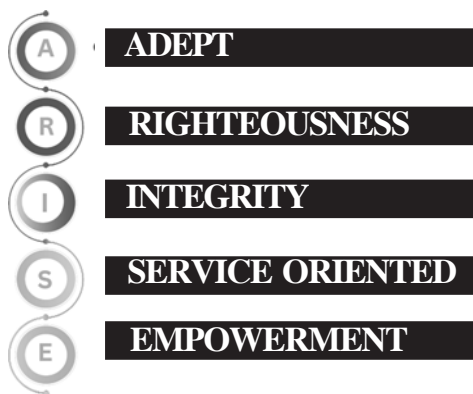


mindedness and the capacity to rejoice in the hopes and aspirations of the underprivileged.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

Mar Thoma College for Women, situated in the Municipal area of Perumbavoor, is the dream child of the late Thomas Mar Athanasius Suffragan Metropolitan of the Mar Thoma Syrian Church. A visionary, Tirumeni had foreseen that this College would cater to the educational needs and the empowerment of the girls of the rural and suburban areas, in and around Perumbavoor.

The people of Perumbavoor who have been feeling the need for an Arts and Science College in the town felt that the Mar Thoma Church, with its long history of excellent service in the educational field in the North Travancore area with their High Schools at Keezhillam (St. Thomas High School, established-1922) and Perumbavoor (Asram High School, established-1931) and 14 Primary Schools in different places in the area would be the right agency to undertake this great task. The Sabha Council of the Mar Thoma Church entrusted the Mar Thoma Evangelistic Association with the responsibility of starting the College at Perumbavoor and Rt. Rev. Thomas Mar Athanasius Suffragan Metropolitan, the then President of the Association, initiated necessary steps for the establishment of the College.

In his great vision and foresight, Tirumeni suggested that the College should be a women's college, which can open the doors of higher education to the educationally backward women of the area. Giving women proper education and building up in them true wisdom and sense of values so that they become responsible citizens with great vision who can immensely help in grooming a new generation of leaders. As the fulfilment of a long-cherished desire of the people of Perumbavoor, and its suburbs, Mar Thoma College for Women Perumbavoor was founded in 1982. The College, initially affiliated to the University of Kerala, started functioning as a Junior College offering the third and fourth groups of Pre Degree course with 92 students. When Mahatma Gandhi University was established in 1984, the College got affiliated to it. The College started offering science courses in 1984. In 1991 the College was upgraded to a Degree College. At present the College offers 11 Under Graduate Programmes, 2 Post Graduate Programmes & 1 Integrated P.G. Programme : B.Sc. Mathematics (1991), B.Sc. Zoology (1993), B.Com. (1995), B.A. History (Vocational) Archaeology and Museology (1998), B.A. English (Vocational) Administrative Assistant (1999), B.Sc. Physics (Vocational) Applied Electronics (2001), B.Sc. Chemistry (2006), B.Com. Computer Application (Self-financing) (2014), B.Voc Renewable Energy Technology & Management (Self-financing) (2018), B.Voc Fashion Technology & Merchandising (Self-financing) (2018), B.Voc Tourism & Hospitality Management (Self-financing) (2018), M.Sc. Zoology (Self-financing) (2006), M.Sc. Mathematics (2013), Integrated Programme in Basic Science - Physics (2021).

The College is included in the list of colleges approved under section-2 (f) and is eligible to receive central assistance in terms of the rule framed under section 12-B of the UGC Act 1956. Since 1984, the College has maintained excellent academic results. Due attention is given to co-curricular activities and the students get ample opportunities for self-expression and



self-development. The College also provides hostel facilities for students.

Mar Thoma College for Women was accredited at the B level (72.5%) in 2003 and re-accredited at the B level by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in 2012. The College was re-accredited at the B+ level (CGPA:2.63) in its 3rd cycle of NAAC accreditation in 2017. In 2023 the college was awarded with A+ grade (CGPA:3.45) in the 4th cycle of NAAC accreditation .

The Mar Thoma Evangelistic Association owns the College. The Most Rev. Dr. Theodosius Mar Thoma Metropolitan is the present Patron of the College. Rt. Rev. Dr. Issac Mar Philoxenos Metropolitan is currently the Manager and the Chairman of the College's Governing Council.

3. Programme Pathways and Curriculum Structure

Students who have joined for any programme under these regulations shall have the option to choose the following pathways for their UG degree and Honours programme.

i. **Major with Multiple Disciplines of Study:**

This pathway is recommended for students who wish to develop core competencies in multiple disciplines of study.

ii. **Interdisciplinary Major:** For these programme pathways, the credits for the major and minor pathways shall be distributed among the constituent disciplines/subjects to attain corecompetence in the interdisciplinary programme.

iii. **Multi-Disciplinary Major:** For multidisciplinary major pathways, the credits for the major and minor pathways will be distributed among the broad disciplines such as Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical and Computer Sciences, Data Analysis, Social Sciences, Humanities, etc..

iv. **Degree with Double Major:** A student who secures a minimum of 50% credits from the first major will be awarded a second major in another discipline if he could secure 40% of credit from that discipline for the 3-year/ 4-year UG degree to be awarded a double major degree.

4. Assessment and Evaluation

- i. The assessment shall be a combination of Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and an End Semester Evaluation (ESE).
- ii. 30% weightage shall be given for CCA. The remaining 70% weight shall be for the ESE.
- iii. Teacher Specific Content will be evaluated under CCA.
- iv) CCA will have two subcomponents Formative Assessment (FA) and Summative Assessment (SA). Each of these components will have equal weightage and to be conducted by the course faculty/ course coordinator offering the course.
- v) FA refers to a wide variety of methods that teachers use to conduct in-process evaluations of student comprehension, learning needs, and academic progress during a lesson, unit, module or course. Suggestive methods of FA are as follows: (anyone or in combinations as decided by the course faculty/ course coordinator)
 - a. Practical assignment
 - b. Observation of practical skills
 - c. Viva voce
 - d. Quiz
 - e. Interview
 - f. Oral presentations
 - g. Computerized adaptive testing
 - h. In-class discussions
 - i. Group tutorial work
 - j. Reflection writing assignments
 - k. Home assignments
 - l. Self and peer Assessments
 - m. Any other method as may be required for specific course/ student by the course faculty/ course coordinator.
- vi. Summative Assessments (SA) are used to evaluate student learning, skill acquisition, and academic achievement at the conclusion of a defined instructional period- typically at the end of a project, unit, module, course or semester. The method of SA will be as follows: (any one as decided by the course faculty/ course coordinator)



- a. Written test
- b. Open book test
- c. Laboratory report
- d. Problem based assignments
- e. Individual project report
- f. Case study report
- g. Team project report
- h. Literature survey
- i. Standardized test

Any other pedagogic approach specifically designed for a particular course by the course faculty/ course coordinator.

4.1 Practical Examination

4.4 Letter Grades and Grade Points

Mark system is followed for evaluating each question. For each course in the semester, letter grade and grade point are introduced in 10-point indirect grading system as per guidelines given below,

- The Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) is computed from the grades as a measure of the student's performance in a given semester. The SGPA is based on the grades of the current term, while the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) is based on the grades in all courses taken after joining the programme of study.
- Based on the marks obtained, the weighted grade point will be mentioned in the student's grade cards.

4.5. Computation of SGPA and CGPA

The following method is recommended to compute the Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA):

- iv) The SGPA is the ratio of the sum of the product of the number of credits with the grade points scored by a student in all the courses taken by a student and the sum of the number of credits of all the courses undergone by a student in the semester, i.e.

$$\text{SGPA} (S_i) = \sum (C_i \times G_i) / \sum C_i$$

Credit Point (CP) of a paper is calculated using the formula:-

$CP = C \times GP$, where *C* is the Credit and *GP* is the Grade point

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a Semester is calculated using the formula:-

$SGPA = TCP/TC$, where *TCP* is the Total Credit Point of that semester.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) is calculated using the formula:-

$CGPA = TCP/TC$, where *TCP* is the Total Credit Point of that programme.



Grade Point Average (GPA) of different category of courses viz. Common Course I, Common Course II, Complementary Course I, Complementary Course II, Vocational Course, Core Course is calculated using the formula:-

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignments are to be done from 1st to 4th Semesters. At least one assignment should be done in each semester for all courses.

SEMINAR/VIVA

A student shall present a seminar in the 5th semester for each paper and appear for viva-voce in the 6th semester for each course.



Note: A separate minimum of 30% marks each for internal and external (for both theory and practical) and aggregate minimum of 35% are required for a pass for a paper. For a pass in a programme, a separate minimum of **Grade D** is required for all the individual papers. If a candidate secures **F Grade** for any one of the paper offered in a Semester/Programme **only F grade** will be awarded for that Semester/Programme until he/she improves this to **D Grade** or above within the permitted period.

Examinations

There shall be University examinations at the end of each semester.

Practical examinations shall be conducted by the University at the end of each semester or at the end of even semesters as prescribed in the syllabus of the particular programme.

End-Semester Examinations: The examinations shall normally be conducted at the end of each semester for college going student.

There shall be one end-semester examination of 3 hours duration for each lecture based and practical courses.

A question paper may contain short answer type/annotation, short essay type questions/problems and long essay type questions. Different types of questions shall have different weightage.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

Evaluation: The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) End Semester Evaluation (ESE) (External Evaluation) and (b) Continuous Evaluation (CE)(Internal Evaluation). 25% weightage shall be given to internal evaluation and the remaining 75% to external evaluation and the ratio and weightage between internal and external is 1:3. Both End Semester Evaluation (ESE) and Continuous Evaluation (CE) shall be carried out using direct grading system.

Direct Grading: The direct grading for CE (Internal) and ESE (External Evaluation) shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 and 0 respectively.

Grade Point Average (GPA): Internal and External components are separately graded and the combined grade point with weightage 1



for internal and 3 for external shall be applied to calculate the Grade Point Average (GPA) of each course. Letter grade shall be assigned to each course.

Internal evaluation for Regular programme: The internal evaluation shall be based on predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests, assignments, seminars, lab skills, records, viva-voce etc.

Components of Internal (CE) and External Evaluation (ESE): Grades shall be given to the evaluation of theory / practical / project / comprehensive viva-voce and all internal evaluations are based on the Direct Grading System.

There shall be no separate minimum grade point for internal evaluation.

The model of the components and its weightages for Continuous Evaluation (CE) and End Semester Evaluation (ESE) are shown below:

No separate minimum is required for internal evaluation for a pass, but a minimum C grade is required for a pass in an external evaluation. However, a minimum C grade is required for pass in a course.

A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course will be permitted to write the examination along with the next batch.

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) Calculations

The **SGPA** is the ratio of sum of the credit points of all courses taken by a student in the semester to the total credit for that semester. After the successful completion of a semester, Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below.

Semester Grade Point Average -SGPA (S_j)

$$= \sum (C_i \times G_i) / \sum C_i$$

(SGPA = Total credit Points awarded in a semester / Total credits of the semester)

Where 'S_j' is the jth semester, 'G_i' is the grade point scored by the student in the ith course 'C_i' is the credit of the i_{th} course.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of a Programme is calculated using the formula:-

$$\text{Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)} = \sum (C_i \times S_i) / \sum C_i$$

(CGPA = Total credit points awarded in all semesters / Total credits of the programme)

Where 'C_i' is the credits for the i_{th} semester 'S_i' is the SGPA for the ith semester. The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to 2 decimal points.

For the successful completion of semester, a student shall pass all courses and score a minimum **SGPA** of 2.0. However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of her/his **SGPA**.



FEE REGULATION

Fee will be levied as prescribed by the Government. Students shall pay the prescribed fees on the due dates. Those who fail are liable to pay a fine of Rs. 5/-. The fee and fine should be paid within seven days after the due date failing which an additional fine of Rs. 5/- will have to be paid.

If the student fails to pay the fees with the fine Rs. 10/- before the last date fixed, her name will be struck off the rolls of the College and she shall not attend class thereafter till all dues are cleared. Until readmission, such student will forfeit attendance. They will have to apply to the Principal for re-admission and remit Rs.50/- as readmission fee.

A receipt in the prescribed form will be issued from the College for all payments made by the student. Such receipts should be retained and produced for verification whenever necessary.

FEE CONCESSION

1. Poor students of other backward communities who are bonafide subjects of Kerala State are eligible for full fee concession. They will have to produce the necessary nativity and income certificate issued by the village officer.
2. Students belonging to scheduled castes and tribe, OEC including kudumbies and converts from them are eligible for full fee concession, lumpsum grant for purchase of books, actual boarding and lodging charges in college hostels or other government hostels or monthly stipend at the rate fixed by the government from time to time. This concession shall be granted by the Department of Development for scheduled castes and tribes on proper application with necessary certificate to be submitted at the prescribed time.



3. **Harness fee concession:** Students who are children of Kerala government servants who died in harness or within six months after retirement will be eligible for full fee concession for one year in each class subject to their annual family income.
4. **Educational concession to the children of Political Sufferers:** Awarded to the children and grand children of political sufferers provided annual income does not exceed Rs. 15000/-
5. **Concession under Kumarapillai Commission Report:** Students belonging to socially and educationally backward classes and other communities whose family income does not exceed Rs. 1,00,000/- in the case of B.A. / B.Sc. and M.A. / M.Sc. are eligible for full concession (except management quota admissions).

The following shall be the guidelines for awarding Grace Marks:

1. Grace marks for each student shall be calculated performance year wise, according to the rules for various categories of activities and shall be assigned to the grace mark account of the student concerned.
2. The candidate may opt for the distribution of grace marks irrespective of pending supplementary/revaluation/scrutiny.
3. If the candidate opts for such distribution, the grace marks shall be distributed considering the marks available at that point of time.
4. The grace marks so distributed shall be given to the best marks obtained by the candidate for a course as on the date of distribution.
5. Such distribution shall be permitted only if such distribution will enable the candidate to obtain a pass for the entire programme.
6. Grace mark distributed under this scheme shall not be carried forward to the improved marks if any obtained by the candidate upon publication of the results and shall be retained in the same examination where it was originally allotted.
7. Moderation awarded to a course of study shall be replaced with grace marks, if sufficient grace marks are available in the grace mark account, after the initial process. The replacement shall be made in the descending order of moderation awarded.
8. Marks available in the grace mark account even after the replacement of moderation shall be distributed equally among the entire courses of the programme.
9. Grace Mark shall be calculated on the basis of the maximum mark for theory external only .
10. Minimum eligibility for availing grace mark shall be 5% marks for Internal/ External, to whichever component Grace Mark is awarded. Grace Mark shall normally be given to Theory External only. However Grace Mark can be awarded to Internal Component when the candidate fails to get a minimum pass in that component so as to enable the candidate to get the minimum required mark for pass in the Internal.



11. If a candidate fails to get a minimum pass even after adding Grace Mark, eligible moderation fixed by the respective Board shall be awarded to get a Pass.
12. If a candidate improves an exam in the next immediate chance Grace Mark shall be awarded to the better mark of the two, provided that, if the candidate has passed the Regular Exam upon addition of Grace marks, such addition to the higher mark shall be effected only upon the request of the Candidate, in writing.
13. If a candidate improves the grade after completion of the course as per clause 7.5 of the CBCS Regulation, 2017 Grace Mark given to that particular Semester shall be given to the better mark.
14. If there is excess Grace Mark, when a candidate gets maximum mark for a semester even after distributing Grace Mark equally to all papers, the excess Grace Mark shall be distributed to other semesters so that the candidate gets maximum benefit of the Grace Mark.
15. If a candidate fails to get a pass in the supplementary exam then the reserved Grace Mark shall be distributed equally to other papers in the regular chance.
16. If a candidate appears for all failed papers in the supplementary exam Grace Marks shall be reserved for all the papers (semester as a whole) of the supplementary exam for which the candidate registers so that the student gets maximum benefit by adding that mark to any Supplementary Paper for which the candidate appears, for getting a Pass.
17. Redistribution shall be given for getting whole pass of the entire Programme.
18. Redistribution shall be limited to two immediate chances of all semesters.
19. While redistributing Grace Mark, when a candidate passes a paper in the regular chance with Grace Mark and gets better mark for that paper in any of the two immediate reappearances even by adding Moderation, the grace mark given to the regular chance may be withdrawn and re distributed to other papers for getting a pass.
20. From 2018 admission onwards application for Grace Mark shall be sub-



mitted online by the candidate, which will be forwarded by the Principal with recommendation to the concerned Department. Hard copy of the application with originals of the Certificates shall be submitted to the concerned Departments and applications along with the attested copies of certificates to the Tabulation Section. Online application in the case of NCC cadets shall be forwarded to the Tabulation Section by the Principal with recommendation.

21. The time limit for submitting application for Grace Mark shall be 31st May of the Performing Year and in the case of NCC 'C' Certificate and National Meet Certificates it shall be 31 st December of the Performing Year.
22. The application for award of Grace Mark for the Final Year Students shall reach the Tabulation Section before 31 st March. But no fine will be levied till 31st May, the last date stipulated for submitting the application.

Grace Marks

Winners in sports events and youth festivals are given grace marks as follows:

- a. Grace marks will be given for the first appearance in Examinations. Improvements and appearance after cancellation and absence will not be considered.
- b. Grace marks will be given after effecting the moderation irrespective of a pass or fail in the Examination.
- c. Grace marks will not be reckoned for fixing ranks.
- d. Marks will be allotted to each paper and 50% of these can be redistributed to other subjects in order to effect a pass.
- e. Students of professional courses are not eligible for grace marks.
- f. Only the winning participants will get grace marks, not the accompanists.
- g. The maximum limit of grace marks is 25%



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- i. Sports - India representation (25%), All India Inter University I, II, III (17, 14, 12) representing combined University (10), approved National, I, II, III Places (10, 8, 7) Inter University representation (7), University / State representation(5).
- ii. Youth Festival - University individual I Place or A Grade (5%), University Group I Place (3%) both to a maximum of 5%. South Zone I, II Places individual and Group events (5,4 additional) National India Group, I, II, III places (10,7,5 additional respectively)
- iii Deaf and Dump students - will be given grace marks 25% of the total marks of each and every paper of the Degree attempted by them subject to a maximum of 25% of the aggregate marks.
- iv NSS volunteer - a) NSS certificate holders 2% b) Attending National Camp with attendance certificates 3% c) Republic Day Camp 5% (Limited to 7%)
- v NCC cadets - (a) Attending Republic Day Camp/Parade 5% (b) Basic Leadership Camp (TSC) / Nau Sainik Camp / Vayu Sainik Camp / Independence Day Camp (Sports and Games at Delhi) 4 % (c) Certificate holders: 'C' Certificate 3% 'B' Certificate 2 % (Limited to 10 %).
- vi Blind Students - I/II/III positions in University Inter University Youth Festivals/Sports/Cultural Competition conducted by the Kerala Federation of the Blind at college level 5%.

GENERAL RULES

1. All candidates who take admission to College must acquaint themselves with the rules and regulations of the College. They will be bound by these, if admitted.
2. Students are expected to carry their identity cards while they are on the campus. The identity cards must be produced whenever demanded by the Principal or other competent authority.
3. College working hours begin at 9.30 a.m. and end at 4.30 p.m. on all working days.
4. Attendance will be taken on all working days. Every student shall attend classes regularly and punctually, any student absent from classes for two days or more consecutively shall report the same to the staff member in charge of attendance.
5. Students should wear full uniform on all working days. Exception from wearing uniform is granted on the following days:-
 - Wednesdays (Exception - Examination Days)
 - Onam Celebration Day, Christmas Celebration Day
 - College Union Inauguration & College Day
 - Days chosen for freshers, farewell and social in the concerned departments.
6. The conduct of students in the College campus and hostel should conform to the highest standards of courtesy, decency and dignity. Students are expected to maintain the noble traditions of the College in discipline and to respect the staff as well as visitors. Absolute silence should be observed at the third bell in the morning.
7. Students should occupy their seats in their respective classrooms immediately after the second bell.
8. Students are not allowed to loiter on the premises during class hours.
9. Students should keep silence during class hours and special functions.
10. Students are expected to co-operate in keeping the College building and the campus neat and tidy. Writing or making marks on the wall or furniture is strictly prohibited.
11. Permission of the Principal is necessary for:-
 - a) Organizing or attending special meetings, entertainments or



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social functions in the College or in the hostel or in its premises.

- b) Using loud speakers, mega phones etc. in the College or in its premises.
 - c) Inviting persons other than the members of the teaching staff of the College for any function in the College or in the hostel.
 - d) Collection or subscription of any kind from the students or members of the staff.
 - e) Putting up any notice on the notice board in the College or elsewhere in its premises.
 - f) Placing or circulating any paper, book or periodical in the reading room of the College in any manner.
12. Notices signed or countersigned by the Principal and published on the College notice board shall be considered as having been brought to the attention of the students and the staff.
 13. The use of alcohol, drugs or tobacco in any form is forbidden in the College premises.
 14. Any student suspended from the College shall not come to the College or its premises during the period of suspension except with the permission of the Principal.
 15. Students are forbidden from engaging in any activity which would interfere with the working of the College.
 16. The authority of the Principal in matters of discipline extends to the conduct of students outside the College.
 17. Whenever a medical certificate has to be produced by a student, it should be from a doctor approved by the Principal.

General Instructions to be followed in the Campus

1. Students are not permitted to use the middle staircase of the main building. They may use all other staircases.
2. Food shall be brought only in (metal) Tiffin box. Plastics/Papers/Banana leaves should not be dropped inside the pit provided exclusively for food waste. Food waste should be disposed only in the pit and not elsewhere.
3. Wash Areas provided are to be used only for washing hands and Tiffin boxes.
4. Students are not permitted to sit in the canteen and eat food brought



from home or elsewhere except for those food items bought from the College canteen.

5. Students are responsible for the cleanliness of their respective classrooms and the respective area of corridor outside the classrooms.
6. Students are allowed to use the Common Room with utmost care and offenders will be penalized.
7. Students are not allowed to use the Staff toilets and wash areas.
8. Soiled sanitary napkins should be disposed only in the prescribed incinerators after wrapping it in a newspaper.
9. Do not waste water. Taps and faucets should be used carefully. The toilets should be kept clean with sufficient water after use.
10. The Conference Hall shall be used only in the presence of the teacher/s concerned.
11. The students must assemble in time at the venue specified for the Assembly or other common programmes in the College.
12. The organizers of every programme should ensure cleanliness of the Auditorium and its premises before and after a programme/meeting is arranged. All the equipment and furniture should be properly maintained.
13. Students must wear the prescribed College uniform on all working days except Wednesdays. However, Uniform must be worn on all examination days including Wednesdays. In case of special occasions or programmes where uniform is not compulsory, students are allowed to dress modestly.
14. The College Chapel is to be used only for worship or prayer.
15. **Students are not allowed to bring mobile phone in the class room or campus.**

ADMISSION AND WITHDRAWAL

1. Admission to undergraduate & post graduate programmes is done through centralised allotment process of the M.G. University.
2. All candidates selected for admission must produce before admission, Transfer certificates from the school or college which they last attended and their S.S.L.C. book or records of examination recognised as



equivalent to S.S.L.C. Candidates to be admitted to the B.A., B.Sc. & B.Com. classes should also produce the certificates of the qualifying examination they have passed (if available) and the marklist of the same.

3. Students who come from other universities must produce the migration certificate before they are admitted.
4. Candidates shall be deemed to have been admitted only when the prescribed fees have been paid.
5. No student shall be considered to have been enrolled in any college term unless she has attended the college at least one day of that term or has paid the fees prescribed or portions thereof.
6. A student applying for a transfer certificate during a college term in which she has been enrolled or applying not later than the 5th working day of the college term immediately following shall forth with be given such certificates upon payment of all fees or other amounts due or such part thereof as the principal may deem fit to demand for the college term in which she was on the rolls.
7. A student who after being admitted applies for a transfer certificate even without attending classes for a day has to pay the fees according to the rules laid down by the university.
8. Transfer certificate shall be issued only after the applicant has paid all the amount due to the college.
9. A student applying for any certificates must apply in the prescribed form giving her name in full and class last attended with group and number. Ordinarily a notice of 24 hours is necessary for issuing a certificate.
10. A former student applying for certificates should give in addition to the above, the year in which they left the College.
11. No certificate will be sent by post unless the transmission charges are pre-paid.
12. Conduct Certificate (except when these are needed while students are still in the College) must be applied for, as soon as possible after students leave the College. The Conduct Certificate is a document which the students have to earn. It will not be issued as a matter of course.
13. A student who leaves the College after enrolment will have to pay the



fees as per rules. As per Government rules, candidates will not be allowed to have their certificate or marklists with out payment of the fees for the whole term. Hence it is advisable that candidates who are admitted, keep attested copies of the certificates or marklists with them when it is submitted at the time of admission.

14. The caution deposit paid by a student shall be retained in the institution till completion of the course of study.
15. The caution deposit will be refunded only after adjusting the dues, if any on account of :
 - a) Loss of library books.
 - b) Recovery of fine for breakages of laboratory equipments.
 - c) Loss caused to properties of the College.
 - d) Arrears of fees, if any.
16. The students should keep in safe custody the receipt issued for remittance of caution deposit during the tenure of the course.
17. Each instalment of tuition fees shall be paid on the due dates notified in the calendar. All cash transactions will be closed in the office at 2 p.m. every day.
18. A receipt by the accountant shall be given to every payment made which the student shall preserve and produce whenever required.
19. Mistakes, if any, in the fee receipts should be pointed out then and there. Complaint made later will not be entertained.
20. Examinations will be held regularly. Serious action will be taken against those who absent themselves from the examinations with out previous permission.

INFRASTRUCTURE, FACILITIES AND ACTIVITIES

LIBRARY

The College Library started functioning in 1982 in a small room, in the old block where the College office functioned. In 1992, the Library was shifted to 'Grace Cottage'. In July 2002, our manager, Rt.Rev.Geevarghese Mar Athanasius Episcopa inaugurated the Library at the western block of the main building. The present Library was built in connection with Silver Jubilee Memorial of the College and was funded by the UGC in 2006. In July 2007, the Manager, Rt.Rev.Dr. Joseph Mar Iraneous Suffragan Metropolitan inaugurated this Library block. The centrally located Library provides easy access to students and members of the staff. The total carpet area of the central library is 3458 Sq.ft. The well furnished college library follows the open access system. Dewey Decimal Classification Scheme is adopted in the Library. The Library has installed the software, 'LIBSOFT' and all the computers are networked. All books are bar coded for easy transaction. Internet facility is also provided free of cost to staff and students during working hours. The Library books collection includes 18152 volumes. Library subscribes 27 journals, 34 popular magazines and 5 newspapers. Library has a bound volume journal collection of 420 volumes. Library document informations are available in the website www.mtcw.libsoft.org. The Library is kept open from 8.30 A.M to 4.30 P.M. on all working days except public holidays.

Library rules

1. Strict silence should be observed in the Library
2. Books and other personal belongings should not be taken into the Library. Each student may take only blank papersheets to the Library for the purpose of taking notes.
3. Library member ID card and loaned documents are not transferable. The borrower is responsible for the documents issued on her card.
4. Member Identity card is to be produced for entering to the Library and for issue of books. Users may swipe their ID card at the gate entry monitoring system.
5. Number of books a student can borrow at a time from the College Library : For Degree Course - two, for P.G. Course - four.



6. In the absence of the Library Assistants, the Library will remain closed from 1.30pm to 2.00 pm.
7. Students should enter the details of the books that are issued to their name in the Issue Register.
8. Books borrowed from the Library must be returned after a week and they can be renewed for a further period of seven days or more if no one else has applied for the same books. If the due date is a holiday, the book must be returned on the next working day. Failure to return book on or before the due date shall entail the student to pay a fine of Re.1/- per day for delay of each book.
9. Books must be carefully verified at the time of issue, the attention of the Librarian should be called to the fact. The borrower will be held responsible for any damage.
10. Disfiguring and tearing of pages of books and scribbling on them and spoiling the binding will be considered as serious damage to the books and in such cases they are either to be replaced , by new copies or get bound by the borrower.
11. Absence from college will not be accepted as an excuse for not returning the books in time.
12. All the books borrowed from the Library by student and the members of the staff must be returned by 15th March every year for the annual stock verification of the Library.
13. The loss of a book should be reported to the Librarian as soon as possible. The borrower is liable to pay the default fine on the book till the date of such report and from that date she will be held responsible for replacing the lost book or paying the cost of replacement of the book.
14. Hall ticket for University examinations, issue of T.C and refund of caution deposit can only be made after clearing all dues to the Library.
15. Students are advised to leave the books on the table or stools that are provided near the shelf and not to keep the book back in the shelves as the documents may get misplaced.
16. Members of the teaching staff can borrow 14 books from the Library for a period of 15 days and they can borrow text books prescribed for their subject for a period of one academic year from the Library.



17. Members of non-teaching staff are allowed 5 books at a time only from the Library for a period of 14 days.
18. Staff who takes leave for more than six months must return all the books borrowed from the Library before proceeding on leave.
19. For lost books, the following procedure will be followed:
 - (i) If new edition or copies of the lost books are available with the book supplier, the book has to be replaced by a new one.
 - (ii) If the lost book is not available for replacement, the value of the lost book will be realised at the following rates
 - (a) Ten times the face value of the books which are published before January, 1946.
 - (b) Six times the face value of the books, which are published before January, 1970.
 - (c) Thrice the face value of the books which are published after January, 1970.
20. Books from the reference section and current periodicals shall not be taken outside the Library. These can only be consulted in the Library.
21. Current magazines, journals and newspapers shall not be issued to staff and students, however back volumes of the periodicals may be issued for a week.
22. Books taken from the Library shall be returned when called for.
23. All cases of violation of rules will be reported to the Principal for suitable action.
24. In all matters regarding the Library, the decision of the Principal shall be final.

FACILITIES

Institute of Information and E-Learning Technology (IleLT)
